PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Relative:

Having been elected President of the Henry Hendricks Family Organization at the reunion last August, I now more than ever appreciate those great men and women who have so ably organized and carried the work to this point. I hope I shall be successful in carrying out your expectations.

At our last Board meeting (this is where a representative of each family is asked to be present), it was determined there has not been enough requests to justify reprinting the red Henry Hendricks Book. We are offering those who have paid for one a choice -- refund your \$30.00, apply the amount towards the new book we are working on, donate it to research, or apply it to computer expense. Please let us know of your decisions.

You were notified of a deadline for submitting updated information or family group sheets to be included in the new book. Your response was so great that we may be up to a year getting everything transferred in the computer. Therefore, any corrected information, births, deaths, research, etc., received prior to the time the book goes to press hopefully will be included.

Briefly reporting on the reunion held last August it was like everything the family organization is doing -- a huge success. In terms of attendance, it was much larger than the last rerunion held in Richmond, Utah five years ago. I'm sorry I can't name everyone present, but I can remember relatives from 18 states of which Joe Hendricks and Henry Broderson and wives (representing the Kentucky side of the family) were present.

It was determined by unanimous vote that the family dues should be increased to \$10.00 per family per year. These funds, along with special donations which we greatly encourage, are used for printing and mailing this publication, dues charged by professional researchers and geneologists we have to hire occasssionally, and computer time and expense. No member of the organization receives anything in the line of compensation unless its a thank you note from grateful friends and relatives. Let me express my thanks and appreciation for those of you who do so much in my family's behalf.

The past year has been most exciting and fruitful. Several areas have been researched and proved. Other information still needs proof.

1. The parentage of Hendrick Hendrickson (II) who married Altje Couwenhoven (parents of Hendrick Hendrickson III who married Sarah Thomson) has conclusively been proven incorrect. His father was also named Hendrick Hendrickson (I). This has been proven correct. (Hendrick II was administrator of his father's estate in Monmouth County, New Jersey in 1735). (Cont.)

Research Director's Report (Cont.)

Hendrick Hendrickson I was married in about 1706 to Helena Cortelou, daughter of Jacques Cortelou and Neeltje Van Duyn. Helena had been previously married twice before and was 13 years older than Hendrick. She was born about 1666 and married Nicholas Rutgers Van Brunt. He died a few months after they were married and shortly before their first child was born. Helena then married Denyse Tuenessen and they had 7 children.

Hendrick Hendrickson I was apparently a friend and contemporary of Helena as Denyse and Hendrick bought land together and their names appear on several documents.

It is not known exactly when Denyse Tuenessen died, but probably around 1705=17=6. Helena married Hendrick Hendrickson I shortly after this time.

We do not know whether Hendrick Hendrickson was previously married or if Helena was actually the mother of the children because of the age difference. This will need to be proven. The only known children are Hendrick Hendrickson II who married Altje Couwenhoven and Geesje Hendrickson who married a Nicholas Van Brunt. Hendrick II and Geesje both lived in Monmouth and were witnesses at the birth of each other's children.

- 2. It is possible that the father of Hendrick Hendrickson I who married Helena Cortelou was the son of Jacob Hendrickson Hafte. The Hafte name was later dropped. Jacob married Geesje Bartels and had seven children, among these Hendrick Hendricks I, baptized 18 Feb. 1679 in Flatbush, New York.
- 3. We also have a major breakthrough in Abraham's family (son of Hendrick Hendrickson III who married Sarah Thomson). We already know that Henry Hendricks (son of Abraham and brother of James and Samuel) had a daughter Cynthia who married William Rider. We have recently learned (through John Allen Rider II, a second great grandson of Lucy Hendricks Rider) that the same William Rider was married first to Lucy Hendricks, (sister of Henry, Samuel and James). William Rider and Lucy Hendricks' oldest daughter Sarah married her first cousin Elisha Hendricks, son of Henry Hendricks. To simplify it, William Rider and his daughter Sarah married son and daughter of Henry (Elisha and Cynthia).

Several family group sheets from the family of William Rider and Lucy Hendricks are being prepared and will be part of the new book.

- 4. We think we have found the family of the brother of John Thomson Hendricks (son of John Hendricks, Abraham's brother). His name was William Perkins Hendricks. When we prove this, several generations of names will have been found.
- 5. A cousin, Dave Hendricks (from the Albert Hendricks line, also a brother of Abraham and John) is working hard to complete the families of 16 children of John Hendrix and Ruth Strader. John is the son of Albert Hendricks.

CONTRIBUTIONS for Research are NEEDED if the work is to continue at its present pace.

A motion that nominations cease was unanimously voted upon. Voting was by secret


ballot. Votes were counted with the following result:
